#### Seeking career wisdom? Ask a professional.

We asked Bobbie to share what she learned in order to obtain her current position and help her remain effective on the job. Here, in random order, are 5 of her takeaways:

- 5: Do what you love and make no compromises there!
- **4: Be bold** and stand up for what you believe to be important. In my case, I am an advocate for students and I keep that at the center of my work.
- 3: Surround yourself with people who inspire you.
- **2: Stay connected** to people in your professional network. This helps me remain current on best practices, learn from others, and build relationships with people in similar roles.
- 1: Do your best to maintain a healthy work-life balance. Work hard, but also drink water, exercise, and spend time with your friends and family doing things that make you happy.
